WIN: The horse you select must come in first.

PLACE: The horse you select must come in first or second.

SHOW: The horse you select must come in first, second, or third.

DAILY DOUBLE: A bet attempting to pick the winner of two consecutive races.

PICK THREE: A bet attempting to select the winners of three consecutive races.

PICK FOUR: A bet attempting to select the winners of four consecutive races.

PICK SIX: A bet attempting to select the winners of six consecutive races.

EXACTA: A bet attempting to select the first two finishers in exact order.

TRIFECTA: A bet attempting to select the first **THREE** finishers in exact order.

SUPERFECTA: A bet attempting to select the first **FOUR** finishers in exact order.

Races honor memory Of Bergstein, Arnold

(Continued from Page One)

"He conducted race meetings at Cal Expo, Bay Meadows, Golden Gate Fields, Del Mar, Pomona, Hollywood Park and Los Alamitos. I know of no one else who has had a greater impact on the harness world."

Stan Bergstein was another legendary figure in harness racing who passed away in 2011 at the age of 87.

Mr. Bergstein was a harness-racing titan who advocated for cooperation between the Standardbred and Thoroughbred industries to solve the sports' common problems.

He stepped down in 2011 after many years as the executive vice president of Harness Tracks of America, the Standardbred industry's trade association.

He was immediately appointed as the organization's first executive emeritus, and continued to advise the associa-

tion and write guest columns for the *Daily Racing Form* until the weeks before his death.

The only person to ever be inducted into the Harness Racing Hall of Fame and its Communicators Hall of Fame, Mr. Bergstein worked in a wide variety of roles at racetracks, auction houses, announcer's booths, and racing publications, and he maintained extensive collections of harness-racing books and artwork.

He was widely respected not only in the harness industry, but also in the Thoroughbred industry, and he served as a mentor to generations of young racing professionals through a close association with the University of Arizona Race Track Industry Program, located in Tucson, for the past 40 years.

Mr. Bergstein was a forceful proponent of forging closer ties between the Standardbred and Thoroughbred industries, most notably in tackling medication abuse and problems with drug testing.

In dozens of commentaries, Mr. Bergstein maintained that the Standardbred industry's problems were, or would be, those of the Thoroughbred industry, and that neglect of a

CAL EXPO HARNESS

TERMINOLOGY

BOXED IN: A horse that is racing on the rail (or fence) and is surrounded by other horses in front, outside and behind it. A horse that is boxed in is held up and unable to gain a clear passage.

BREAK: To start galloping and lose natural trotting or pacing rhythm. It usually occurs more with trotters than pacers.

BROODMARE: A female horse, generally retired from racing, used for breeding purposes.

CARD: Another term for a program of racing. For example, a person may refer to there being twelve races on the card, it simply means 12 races will be staged that particular day.

CATCH DRIVER: A driver which doesn't train his or her own horses, and is engaged by other trainers and owners to drive their horses.

CLAIMING RACE/ CLAIMER: A race where any of the entrants may be claimed (purchased) for a specified amount.

problem in one sport would damage the other.

Mr. Bergstein borrowed from the Thoroughbred industry early in his career, incorporating claiming races as a racing secretary while working at the Chicago tracks in the 1950s.

At the time, the harness racing industry did not run claiming races, and they are now as commonplace in Standardbred racing as they are in Thoroughbred racing.

Mr. Bergstein also spearheaded the creation of Standardbred Investigative Services, a security agency modeled on the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau.

A native of Illinois, Mr. Bergstein attended harness races as a young man and received a journalism degree from Northwestern University. He was the former executive editor of *Hoof Beats* magazine, and the former vice president of publicity and public relations for the United States Trotting Association.

Cal Expo trackman/program director Marty Bridges credits Stan Bergstein with bringing him into harness racing as a profession.

EXCEPTIONAL

1st over far turn, kept marching on rim, urged, 3across late.

Decent form. Gotta use too.

IM BLUE TOO

Left with many, behind last turn gapper, no chance. Finds a pretty good spot tonight.

IMMA TANK

Left 3wide, parked eighth plus, tucked, rail rode balance. No chance into fast heat. Drops, usable despite outside.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

CLASS: A horse which has raced adequately against better foes may find his way into the winner's circle, while a horse who has beaten inferior foes may find tougher horses not to its liking. A fairly reliable way of checking class is comparing the purses of the previous races and the present race.

COLORS: The special colorful jacket worn by drivers when in a race. Unlike Thoroughbred racing, drivers register their own colors and wear them every time they race.

COLT: A male 3 years of age or less.

CONDITIONED RACE: A race where eligibility is based on age, sex, money won, or races won. For example, "3-year-old fillies, non-winners of \$10,000 or 4 races."

COVER: A horse that races with another horse in front of him is said to race with cover, as the leading horse cuts the wind resistance.

CROSS FIRE: When a horse's hind foot strikes the opposite front foot or leg.

CAL EXPO PICK 3 RULES

1. Any scratch in the first leg of a Pick Three is now a refund.
2. A wager with a scratch in the second leg creates a consolation pool.
3. A wager with a scratch in the third leg creates another consolation pool.
4. A wager with scratches in the second and third leg creates another consolation pool.
5. A consolation pool is the sum of all wagers that include the scratch(es) for that leg or legs. The winning combination for the consolation pool is a wager with the winner or winners of the non-scratch leg(s).

"After college and two years in the Army, I was employed by the small business association. At night, after work, I was a regular patron at Sportsman's Park and Maywood in Chicago.

"My supervisor, a former sportswriter for the *Chicago Daily News*, knew of my interest and called Stan to set up a meeting. Surprisingly, I was to meet him at Du Quoin on Hambletonian Day. Watching Stan call the races from a slightly elevated booth on the infield adjacent to the finish line was thrilling and between races we talked about racing, horses, drivers and trainers.

"His knowledge of the sport was amazing and I had never met anyone like him, and still haven't. He introduced me to John Tinsley, the program director for all the Chicago tracks and John hired me on the spot. It's been a great ride, doing something I love."

Gene Vallandingham first met Stan Bergstein in 1959 when he was working for the legendary Joe O'Brien. "Stan came to Joe's farm every spring for the annual Camptown racing weekend, when all of Shafter would be there for a day of racing. Stan was the true voice of harness racing, he was liked by all and I miss him."

Took easy run to lane, inherited pocket, urged to save show slot. Chip takes the drive. In store for easy run.

CRUSIN FOR YOU

Parked eighth, yielded past quarter, back out far turn, attacked to end, tough. Gerry returns. Slice maybe.

WHY ASK WHY

Left with many, yielded, followed winner out into lane, urged. James choice. That will get him lots of support.

JAZZMANIAN DEVIL

Rushed to be off gate 3-4, at the back, no rally in the tuner. Mooney returns. Tighter?

MINT TO CRUISE

Left well, yielded, inherited 2hole midfar turn, shook out deep str, up. Solid form. Steps back up. Obvious use.

GD ROCK MY WORLD

Led early, yielded, soft trip to the lane, driven, no rally. Extra week off. Negative post switch. Who knows?

MISTER HAT

Sat in whole trip, some stretch urging, just fair. Outside again. Obvious tactical woes for him again.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

DAM: The female parent, or mother, of a horse. Also a term occasionally used when you take a tough beat in a photo finish.

DEAD HEAT: A situation in which the judges cannot separate two or more horses when judging the outcome of a race.

DISTANCED: A horse that is out of touch with the rest of the field at any point of the race, usually more than 25 lengths behind the leader. This is often referred to as finished distanced.

DRIVER: The person holding a license or permit to drive harness horses. There are different types of licenses, which correspond to differing levels of experience.

EARLY/LATE CLOSER: A race requiring payments which start much closer to the actual race date than a stake "Early" and "Late" involve specified periods of time.

FILLY: A female 3 years of age or less.

PYLON RULE

(For Horses Racing Without Interference)

1. Going inside two (2) pylons and lapped-on at the finish: The offending horse will be disqualified and placed behind any lapped-on horses at the wire.
2. Going inside three (3) or more consecutive pylons: The offending horse will be disqualified and placed last.
3. If an unfair advantage is gained by going inside, over, or in-between one or more pylons in order to pass another competitor: The offending horse will be disqualified.

The steward's discretion applies to all placement.

Chris Schick said, "Stan was foremost a kind and compassionate person. He was a true visionary in the harness racing industry. In 1979, well before simulcasting, he so rightly stated the future of the industry was in how well we brought the product to the public. He was also very vocal of the industry for being reluctant to embrace change. Our industry lost a giant when he passed."

Many of the sport's stars assembled at the Meadowlands for qualifiers on an overcast, windless Saturday morning over a track that may have been slightly dulled by overnight rains with the temperature in the mid 60's at 10 A.M.

The card began with the Grand Circuit stakes-winning Father Patrick filly Special Honor (Andy Miller) closing through the stretch to edge mile-cutter Fate Smiled (Matt Kakaley) in 1:54 4/5 (27 2/5 final quarter). Can't Touch It (Scott Zeron) held safe for third and Goldsmith Maid winner Sonnet Grace (Yannick Gingras) was fourth in a conservative effort.

Brittany Farms, Marvin Katz and Al Libfeld bred and own the winner, trained by Julie Miller.

WINDSUN GALAXIE

Led at once, attacked far turn, no resistance, stalled suddenly once passed. Hoping for a slice of it.

ITS A HORSE

Moved out from last into far turn, some urging, fair come-backer. How much tighter tonight?

SILVERLODE

Reserved to half, followed 2nd fave round the bend, alongside into lane, light urging, confident. Obvious odds on choice.

ONE CHIEF

Popped out from half, sped by leader, attacked by winner into lane, tough to wire. The main rival once more.

MAJESTIC LADY JO

Gapped early, lost contact nearing half. Been off since. Adds Rene.

DOUGS HOBBY HORSE

Sat in to late last turn, took out on rim, urged, closed solidly. Fires out, yields, price thought.

FRANKS BEST

Rode cones whole trip, failed to make any menacing moves. Now the outside. That's a tough assignment.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

FIRST-OVER: The first horse to make a move on the leader in a race, moving up on the outside. Those following the first over horse on the outside are second over, third over, etc.

FOAL: A newly born horse. Also describes the act of a mare giving birth.

FREE LEGGED: A pacer which races without wearing hobbles.

GELDING: A castrated male of any age.

HANDICAPPING: The first step in successfully picking a winner (or "handicapping") is becoming familiar with reading the racing program. Each program has a section explaining the information

format used at that particular track. Probably the best place to start when handicapping Standardbreds is time. Since over 99 percent of all harness races are conducted at the one-mile distance, valid comparisons can be made among horses.

CHRB Rule No. 1699

(b) A horse shall not interfere with or cause any other horse to lose stride, ground or position in a part of the race where the horse loses the opportunity to place where it might be reasonably expected to finish.

(c) A horse which interferes with another and thereby causes any other horse to lose stride, ground or position, when such other horse is not at fault and when such interference occurs in a part of the race where the horse interfered with loses the opportunity to place where it might, in the opinion of the Stewards, be reasonably expected to finish, may be disqualified and placed behind the horse so interfered with.

Hall of Fame trainer Linda Toscano has a sharp-looking prospect in the 3-year-old Muscle Hill colt Guaranteed (Tim Tetrick), who won his second qualifier in as many tries this morning by closing furiously under no urging into a 27 2/5 end of a 1:54 4/5 mile to nip Summit In Sight (A. Miller) and Halliama (Trond Smedshammer).

The winner, unraced at two, was a \$125,000 Lexington Select Yearling Sale (LSYS) purchase by Michael and William Pozefsky and Myron Eckstein from breeders Tommy B. Andersson and Courant AB.

Matter Of Fact (Marcus Melander), who led throughout, and the closing French Café (A. Miller) went under the wire together in 1:55 4/5 (28 1/5 final quarter) in race three, with the latter prevailing by a nose. Golden Tricks (Ake Svanstedt) was third.

French Café is another daughter of Father Patrick and is a Katz & Libfeld homebred, again stabled in the Julie Miller barn.

Miss Trixton scored for Melander from first-over in 1:55 3/5 (27 4/5 final quarter) over Trix Are For Kids (Corey Callahan). The winner is a

KISS ON THE LIPS

Back after a month plus on the shelf. Your guess is as good as mine.

LA MADAWNA DE ROSA

Sat in to lane, heavy traffic, urged, then tight quarters wire. Adds James. Could awaken.

CENALTA COUGAR

Pushed leaving, yielded to winner mid turn, tracked balance, stalled out final sixteenth. Ryan takes the drive.

MELODIES THAT ROCK

2nd over half, good trip to lane, kicked wide, rushed up, hung bit wire. Steve's choice. Solid recent form.

PLACE AT THE BEACH

Left on delay, parked past quarter, braked, to far turn, sped up to repel attack, urged to hold. Steps up, more confident?

WIZZEL STIX

Far back the mile, tough to gauge late interest. Segues from claimers. Maybe a slice.

DANDYS DUDUDIDUDU

2nd over past half, gapped flow far turn, mild traffic into lane, then flattened. Mooney's choice tonight.

MISSPANDEROSAJONES

1st out near half, rimmed balance, kept marching, held tough to end. Luke gets the drive here. Obvious user.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

HARNESS: The gear which is used to attach the sulky to a horse, to carry the hobbles and to enable the driver to steer the horse.

HOME STRETCH or STRETCH: The straight length of the track, nearest the spectators, where the finish line is situated. It is called this because it is the final part of the track a horse travels down during a race -- on its run 'home' (or run to the finish line).

HOBBLES/HOPPLES: The straps which connect the front and rear legs on the same side of a horse. Most pacers wear hobbles to help balance their stride and maintain a pacing gait. The length of hobbles is adjustable and a trainer registers the length that best suits his or her horse. There are also trotting hobbles that work through a pulley system to help trotters maintain their gait.

HORSE: A male 4 years of age or older.

Pick Four (16%) - \$30,000 Guaranteed Pool

To win the **Pick Four**, you must select the winners of the four (4) races designated as the pick four races. Otherwise, pursuant to (CHRB 1976.9): **If no ticket correctly selects all four winners**, 10% of the net pool will be paid to the winner(s) correctly selecting the most winners, **90% of the net pool will CARRYOVER to the next Pick Four Pool.**

Trixtion filly from million dollar winner Possess The Magic, a \$105,000 LSYS purchase for the Order By Stable from breeder Hanover Shoe Farm.

Last year's International Trot winner Cruzado Dela Noche (Mattias Melander) was sharp in his 2019 bow, leading all the way and trotting a 26 3/5 final quarter to hold off Top Flight Angel (A. Miller) in 1:53 3/5. Yes Mickey completed the three-horse field. All three of these top trotters are eligible to the May 4 Cutler Memorial, the first major stake of the 2019 Meadowlands season.

North American record holder Ice Attraction (Andy McCarthy) is back for another season versus the top mare trotters and got her year underway with a front-stepping 1:55 4/5 (27 4/5 final quarter) effort under her own power. Muscle M Up (Sarah Svanstedt) outmuscled E L Platinum and her husband Ake for the place with a nice stretch move. All three are trained in the Svanstedt barn, and Ake owns the winner with Sipple, Burroughs and Little E LLC.

Dan Patch award-winning 2-year-old pacing filly Warrawee Ubeaut (Yannick Gingras) got her sophomore season off to a great start, as the fastest

1st out near half, attacked winner to lane, stalled bit late. Rene returns to the sulky.

LUCKY SEVEN OF LODI

Led early, brushed back near half, attacked into lane, faded suddenly once passed in bow for Johnson barn. Ryan returns.

BRUSHIN ALBERT

Left 3wide to lead, yielded past quarter, backed up far turn, traffic to lane, tough to gauge. Another thought.

READ ME MY RIGHTS

Took out far turn, wide bid, faded out a bit late stages. Class relief, Mooney's choice.

SUN BEAU TOUGHIE

Took cover past half, failed to keep up late stages. Also drops. Steve returns.

TIYAGA

Hopped on cover train, good lead up trip, followed 3wide, urged to save show. Luke's choice. Needs some racing luck.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

INQUIRY: Stewards may conduct an inquiry as a result of any incident which may have occurred during a race, to determine whether or not certain drivers and/or horses were responsible for the incident and whether they should receive due punishment.

INVITATIONAL: A race for the top horses in the area. Also known as an Open or Free-For-All.

LAME: The term used to describe a horse which is limping or has difficulty walking properly, similar to leg cramping, or a Charley-horse.

LEASING: As opposed to buying a harness horse, people have the option of leasing one. Just like some people lease a car instead of paying the money up-front, leasing a horse gives people use of a horse without large capital outlay. An agreement or contract must be drawn up between the two parties, and the lease must be registered with the relevant controlling body.

LAST DRAGON

1st out well before half, cover midfar turn, urged, held fair. Enough class relief to have a good look here.

FOX VALLEY HOSS

Sped from gate, yielded, pocket tripped to lane, urged, held off 1st up foe. Mooney's choice over 2 others.

DON'T DOUBT THE LAKERS

Out near half, gapped flow far turn, tired. Post relief; note he won with James last month.

WHO DAT LOVE

Backed up to last, came wide, solid close, too late. Ryan takes the call tonight. One more user.

BECKYS DREAMBOAT

Left with many, soft trip to lane, had traffic, cleared, okay to save show. Rene steers here.

CRASH AND BURN

2nd over past half, good lead up trip, urged, okay try. Adds Gerry. Back outside.

JOHNNY GUN

Moved out near half, unable to keep up in blazing third panel, flattened out in wickedly quick event. Tough draw again.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

MAIDEN: A horse which has not yet won a race.

MARE: A female 4 years of age or more. In some jurisdictions 5 or more.

PARI-MUTUEL RACE: A race in which wagering is allowed, held at a track licensed by a state's racing commission. Pari-mutuel races are held at licensed pari-mutuel racetracks or fairs.

PARKED: A horse racing on the outside, with at least one horse between it and the inside rail. A horse on the outside of two horses is said to be **THREE WIDE**.

PHOTO FINISH: When two horses cross the finish too closely to identify a winner, officials call for a photograph of the race, taken exactly at the finish line, to help them determine who was ahead.

POCKET: A horse in the pocket is sitting in perfect position behind the leader, also known as the **two-hole** or the **pocket**.

C.H.R.B. BREAKING RULES

1722. Breaking. Should any horse break from its gait in either trotting or pacing, the driver shall:

(a) Where clearance exists, take such horse to the outside.

(b) Attempt to pull the horse to its gait.

(c) Lose ground.

1723. Lapped-on Break. The driver of a horse which has broken from its gait who has complied with the breaking rule shall not be set back unless a contending horse on his gait is lapped on the hind quarter of the breaking horse at the finish.

Moved from last 3rd over far turn, angled wide, rallied fastest. Been giving signals. Usable.

CAL EXPO HARNESS

POST POSITION: Generally, the closer a horse starts to the inside rail or barrier of the track (especially on smaller tracks), the better is its chance of winning. At the start, horses must either "leave" (start quickly) to get a good position or else find a place on the rail to avoid racing on the outside of other horses. When racing on the outside the horse is said to be "parked out", and loses ground on every turn. A horse on the inside has a better chance to get to the rail or quickly get a good position.

QUALIFIER: A race in which a horse must go a mile below an established time standard to prove itself capable of competing in pari-mutuel races.

SCRATCHING: A horse that is withdrawn (or scratched) from a race before the start.

SIRE: The male parent, or father, of a horse.

STARTER'S RULES

1728. Starter's Control. The starter shall have control over the horses from the formation of the parade until he gives the word 'go.' The starter shall report to the stewards any misconduct or violation on the part of the driver and may order any unmanageable or disabled horse declared (scratched) from the race with the concurrence of the stewards.

1729. Starting the race. The starter shall bring the horses to the starting gate as near one-quarter of a mile from the starting point as the track may permit, and shall endeavor to get all horses away in position and on gait. If a horse refuses to come to the gate, is unmanageable or liable to cause an accident or injury to any other horse or driver, it may be declared and all monies wagered on that horse shall be refunded.

1730. Recalls. The starter may sound a recall for only the following reasons: 1-A horse scored ahead of the gate; 2- There is interference prior to the word 'go' being given; 3-A horse has broken equipment; 4-A horse falls prior to the word 'go' being given. There shall be no recall after the word 'go' is given and any horse, regardless of his position or an accident, shall be deemed a starter from the time he entered into the starter's control unless dismissed.
