TERMINOLOGY

WIN: The horse you select must come in first.

PLACE: The horse you select must come in first or second.

SHOW: The horse you select must come in first, second, or third.

DAILY DOUBLE: A bet attempting to pick the winner of two consecutive races.

PICK THREE: A bet attempting to select the winners of three consecutive races.

PICK FOUR: A bet attempting to select the winners of four consecutive races.

PICK SIX: A bet attempting to select the winners of six consecutive races.

EXACTA: A bet attempting to select the first two finishers in exact order.

TRIFECTA: A bet attempting to select the first **THREE** finishers in exact order.

SUPERFECTA: A bet attempting to select the first **FOUR** finishers in exact order.

PROFILE: NATHAN BAIN

Nathan Bain is hooked on harness racing

While a handful of people know at a young age what career they will pursue, few are able to start doing it at age 12. Nathan Bain is an exception.

Representing the third harness racing generation in his family, the 17-year-old Bain became in-terested in announcing horse races at age 11, made his first call at 12, and has now announced 21 times at six different tracks.

He has enjoyed every second of it.

"I love race calling," said Bain. "It's fun getting the excitement, getting the crowd on their tiptoes in the race, and keeping them informed of the story

Stuck at back thru slowed pace, 1st over into far turn, failed to show much late interest. Outside again. Time off as well. Who knows?

you're telling, what's happening on the track."

Bain was raised and lives in South Woodslee, a small community in the southwestern Ontario town of Lakeshore, about 20 miles southeast of Windsor. His grandfather, Tom Bain, has owned, trained and driven Standardbreds for more than 50 years. Nathan's father, Dave Bain, followed in his father's footsteps and has spent his life in the business.

Nathan was different, though. With the family owning a stable, he'd been around horses his whole life, but it took the opening of nearby Leamington Raceway in 2013, when he was 11, to re-ally pique his interest.

"It was huge for the area for racing to return to Leamington after the [2012] closure of Windsor Raceway, and I

CAL EXPO HARNESS

TERMINOLOGY

BOXED IN: A horse that is racing on the rail (or fence) and is surrounded by other horses in front, outside and behind it. A horse that is boxed in is held up and unable to gain a clear passage.

BREAK: To start galloping and lose natural trotting or pacing rhythm. It usually occurs more with trotters than pacers.

BROODMARE: A female horse, generally retired from racing, used for breeding purposes.

CARD: Another term for a program of racing. For example, a person may refer to there being twelve races on the card, it simply means 12 races will be staged that particular day.

CATCH DRIVER: A driver which doesn't train his or her own horses, and is engaged by other trainers and owners to drive their horses.

CLAIMING RACE or CLAIMER: A race where any of the entrants may be claimed (purchased) for a specified amount.

saw how amazing the industry was," he said.

Bain's family was involved in the push to open the half-mile track, and in the summer of 2014 he took a job opening and closing the gates on the backstretch.

Bain loved seeing the horses and watching the races. He also loved the excitement generated by the voice over the loudspeaker, so much so that he wanted to become that voice. So he began practicing calling races during his downtime at the track.

"I'd put [races] on the computer, on the TV, and I'd announce them like if I were the announcer there," he said. "Also, I would keep a program and pretend—a future race, I would pretend to announce it. And I just kept practicing at it."

CAL EXPO HARNESS

CLASS: A horse which has raced adequately against better foes may find his way into the winner's circle, while a horse who has beaten inferior foes may find tougher horses not to its liking. A fairly reliable way of checking class is comparing the purses of the previous races and the present race.

COLORS: The special colorful jacket worn by drivers when in a race. Unlike Thoroughbred racing, drivers register their own colors and wear them every time they race.

COLT: A male 3 years of age or less.

CONDITIONED RACE: A race where eligibility is based on age, sex, money won, or races won. For example, "3-year-old fillies, non-winners of \$10,000 or 4 races."

COVER: A horse that races with another horse in front of him is said to race with cover, as the leading horse cuts the wind resistance.

CROSS FIRE: When a horse's hind foot strikes the opposite front foot or leg.

CAL EXPO PICK 3 RULES

1. Any scratch in the first leg of a Pick Three is now a refund.
2. A wager with a scratch in the second leg creates a consolation pool.
3. A wager with a scratch in the third leg creates another consolation pool.
4. A wager with scratches in the second and third leg creates another consolation pool.
5. A consolation pool is the sum of all wagers that include the scratch(es) for that leg or legs. The winning combination for the consolation pool is a wager with the winner or winners of the non-scratch leg(s).

With the encouragement of his parents, Bain was confident enough by the end of the summer to ask for a shot in the booth. He showed track announcer Marty Adler a video of himself doing one of his practice calls, and with the blessing of the track's board of directors, was given the go-ahead.

At age 12, he became the youngest person to ever call a race in North America.

Bain's call went over well enough that he did a few more at Leamington Raceway each of the next two years, building up enough notoriety to work at other tracks, including larger venues like Northfield Park and Isle Casino Racing Pompano Park.

He credits other announcers—especially Shannon "Sugar" Doyle from The Raceway at Western Fair District in

Parked eighth, yielded, tripped to lane, urged between rivals, held gamely. Moves outside, adds chip.

Brushed out near half, powered past leader with wicked 3rd panel, intermittent str urging. Tries Gerry here.

LICKCREEK SPEEDWAY

Rode cones whole trip, found seam along cones midstretch, solid rally. Iffy-gaited but fast. Plan from outside?



CAL EXPO HARNESS

DAM: The female parent, or mother, of a horse. Also a term occasionally used when you take a tough beat in a photo finish.

DEAD HEAT: A situation in which the judges cannot separate two or more horses when judging the outcome of a race.

DISTANCED: A horse that is out of touch with the rest of the field at any point of the race, usually more than 25 lengths behind the leader. This is often referred to as finished distanced.

DRIVER: The person holding a license or permit to drive harness horses. There are different types of licenses, which correspond to differing levels of experience.

EARLY/LATE CLOSER: A race requiring payments which start much closer to the actual race date than a stake "Early" and "Late" involve specified periods of time.

FILLY: A female 3 years of age or less.

PYLON RULE

(For Horses Racing Without Interference)

1. Going inside two (2) pylons and lapped-on at the finish: The offending horse will be disqualified and placed behind any lapped-on horses at the wire.
2. Going inside three (3) or more consecutive pylons: The offending horse will be disqualified and placed last.
3. If an unfair advantage is gained by going inside, over, or in-between one or more pylons in order to pass another competitor: The offending horse will be disqualified.

The steward's discretion applies to all placement.

London, Ontario, and Gabe Prewitt from Pompano Park—for mentoring him and helping to spread his name and give him opportunities.

Doyle met Bain at Leamington Raceway in 2014 and was immediately impressed by him. The two stayed in contact and Doyle gave Bain the chance to do post parade calls in London and ultimately let him announce a few races there.

"I could see the passion, the excitement when a horse race was starting up there in Leamington that day," Doyle said of his first encounter with Bain.

"You can see it in a person, the love they have for the sport. And any time he's around London here, and whether it's in the paddock or he's up in the announcer booth with me, I can certainly just see it. I've got a

Second over into far turn, poor flow, had to angle wide, solid rally considering. Adds chip. Tough spot.

DELIGHTFULLY WILD

1st out near half, began to stall on the rim midfar turn, flattened. James choice. Certainly usable.

GETTER QUEEN FLUSH

Took easy run along the fence, had a clear shot but no late moves. Undercard seems best case scenario.

BRIGHTEN YOUR LIFE

Sluggish approaching the start, gapped at back whole trip, needed tuner. Debuts for Jenna.

CAPITOL HILL

Cover past half, followed rival 3wide into lane, failed to advance. Might fire out here.

MAGNIFIQUE

Rode cones, backed up to last, tipped out into lane, had some go. Figures to be flying at the end.

LEGIO X EQUESTRIS

Sent to lead, picked up the clip past half, pulled clear, intermittent urging, strong. Ryan's choice over 2 others. Adds.

DANCINGONTHE SAND

2nd over past half, kicked wide around stalled foe, urged to save place. The main danger despite outside.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

FIRST-OVER: The first horse to make a move on the leader in a race, moving up on the outside. Those following the first over horse on the outside are second over, third over, etc.

FOAL: A newly born horse. Also describes the act of a mare giving birth.

FREE LEGGED: A pacer which races without wearing hobbles.

GELDING: A castrated male of any age.

HANDICAPPING: The first step in successfully picking a winner (or "handicapping") is becoming familiar with reading the racing program. Each program has a section explaining the information format used at that particular track. Probably the best place to start when handicapping Standardbreds is time. Since over 99 percent of all harness races are conducted at the one-mile distance, valid comparisons can be made among horses.

CHRB Rule No. 1699

(b) A horse shall not interfere with or cause any other horse to lose stride, ground or position in a part of the race where the horse loses the opportunity to place where it might be reasonably expected to finish.

(c) A horse which interferes with another and thereby causes any other horse to lose stride, ground or position, when such other horse is not at fault and when such interference occurs in a part of the race where the horse interfered with loses the opportunity to place where it might, in the opinion of the Stewards, be reasonably expected to finish, may be disqualified and placed behind the horse so interfered with.

pretty good read on people, and Nathan, he is hooked on harness."

Doyle added that Bain's ability to use social media to get in touch with people in the business all over the continent has helped him establish himself at a young age.

Still, it's the combination of hard work and natural ability that has led to his early success.

"I went over the field the night before [my first call]," Bain said. "I kept practicing and practicing. I remember the night before, trying to get the names right of the horses."

He added that his familiarity with Leamington Raceway made subsequent calls easier, but more preparation was needed to call at places like Pompano Park.

Parked eighth plus, braked while untested, sped home on own. Sharp return, tackles tougher though.

MIKIS MAGIC RIDE

Parked turn, braked, repelled last turn attacked, caught deep in drive. Luke's choice in here. Gotta use.

FIRSTDIBBS

Out well before half, rushed up alongside leader, held tough to end. James returns. Post relief too.

WIZARD OF ODDS

Grabbed cover half, good lead up trip, urged, fair into fast panel. Can also get into it.

KABOOM POW

Left to tuck, 2nd over half, loose cover to lane, angled wide, eked out 2nd spot. Midpriced thoughts.

LAISSEZMOIPICOLER

Took out past half, failed to keep up round the bend. Adds Mooney. Tough to like after last.

EDDIE BRUSH

Rode cones the trip, driven in late, 3 vying for 2nd. Negative post switch deters.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

HARNESS: The gear which is used to attach the sulky to a horse, to carry the hobbles and to enable the driver to steer the horse.

HOME STRETCH or STRETCH: The straight length of the track, nearest the spectators, where the finish line is situated. It is called this because it is the final part of the track a horse travels down during a race -- on its run 'home' (or run to the finish line).

HOBBLES/HOPPLES: The straps which connect the front and rear legs on the same side of a horse. Most pacers wear hobbles to help balance their stride and maintain a pacing gait. The length of hobbles is adjustable and a trainer registers the length that best suits his or her horse. There are also trotting hobbles that work through a pulley system to help trotters maintain their gait.

HORSE: A male 4 years of age or older.

STARTER'S RULES

1728. Starter's Control. The starter shall have control over the horses from the formation of the parade until he gives the word 'go.' The starter shall report to the stewards any misconduct or violation on the part of the driver and may order any unmanageable or disabled horse declared (scratched) from the race with the concurrence of the stewards.

1729. Starting the race. The starter shall bring the horses to the starting gate as near one-quarter of a mile from the starting point as the track may permit, and shall endeavor to get all horses away in position and on gait. If a horse refuses to come to the gate, is unmanageable or liable to cause an accident or injury to any other horse or driver, it may be declared and all monies wagered on that horse shall be refunded.

1730. Recalls. The starter may sound a recall for only the following reasons: 1-A horse scored ahead of the gate; 2- There is interference prior to the word 'go' being given; 3-A horse has broken equipment; 4-A horse falls prior to the word 'go' being given. There shall be no recall after the word 'go' is given and any horse, regardless of his position or an accident, shall be deemed a starter from the time he entered into the starter's control unless dismissed.

The ability to arrive at the track confident and prepared is what caught Prewitt's eye when, after a period of talking on social media, Prewitt allowed Bain to call a post parade.

"It takes a lot of courage to step up and do that," Prewitt said. "I've had many people before say they want to call a race or do something like that, that have stepped up and, you know, they kind of back out at the last minute. They decide they don't really want to go forward with it and kind of get cold feet."

Bain's ability is particularly rare in a teenager, Prewitt said.

Part of that might be attributed to workload. An 11th grader at Belle River District High School, Bain has to meet the demands of any high school student, but said he is able to keep up by making full

Sent under urging, yielded before quarter, back out late final bend, driven to get it. Very sharp, steps up.

Left 3wide, parked quick turn, braked to last bend, took pressure, held okay. Adds Ryan, the plan?

ALLMYXSLIVENTEXAS

Took cover from last into far turn, some stretch urging, solid comeback tuner. Deserves top billing.

TO THE LIMIT

Sped from gate, pushed eighth plus, yielded, chased to lane, cleared, urged, strong late surge. Week off. Adds Gerry.

COZ AND EFFECT

Away well, pocket behind strong winner to lane, tipped out, urged, strong in defeat. Very tough spot from bad post.

BETTOR IN THE BANK

Rode cones whole trip, behind gapper to lane, finished fair once free. Adds Rene. Obviously hindered by #8.



CAL EXPO HARNESS

INQUIRY: Stewards may conduct an inquiry as a result of any incident which may have occurred during a race, to determine whether or not certain drivers and/or horses were responsible for the incident and whether they should receive due punishment.

INVITATIONAL: A race for the top horses in the area. Also known as an Open or Free-For-All.

LAME: The term used to describe a horse which is limping or has difficulty walking properly, similar to leg cramping, or a Charley-horse.

LEASING: As opposed to buying a harness horse, people have the option of leasing one. Just like some people lease a car instead of paying the money up-front, leasing a horse gives people use of a horse without large capital outlay. An agreement or contract must be drawn up between the two parties, and the lease must be registered with the relevant controlling body.

Pick Four (16%) - \$30,000 Guaranteed Pool

To win the **Pick Four**, you must select the winners of the four (4) races designated as the pick four races. Otherwise, pursuant to (CHRB 1976.9): **If no ticket correctly selects all four winners, 10% of the net pool will be paid to the winner(s) correctly selecting the most winners, 90% of the net pool will CARRYOVER to the next Pick Four Pool.**

When not in the booth, Bain is still working hard to promote the sport. He contributes to Leamington and Dresden Raceways' social media accounts and does a pre-game show at Leamington.

In 2018, he took a position as a handicapper and on-track host at Dresden. He is a youth delegate for the U. S. Harness Writers Association (USHWA) where he helped write bios for 2018 Dan Patch Award candidates. On his own time, he publishes articles about racing, along with some picks, to his personal blog.

Moved from back 4th over far turn, bad flow, came 3wide, no chance. Decent form. Drops a notch. Gotta use.

Left to protect, rode cones to lane, never had a clear path. Luke in the bike. Third start angle. Dangerous.

SWAGASAURUSREX

Left well, pocket tripped behind strong winner, faded out final furlong. Couple weeks off. Who knows?

JUSTABITCRAZY

Left to tuck, back on rim near half, kept marching, tough to the end. Hikes, outside again. Leaves?

CONTEMPORAY LEGEND

Left fast, brushed back near half, blazed home under urging, strong. Also sharp, steps up. Plan?



CAL EXPO HARNESS

MAIDEN: A horse which has not yet won a race.

MARE: A female 4 years of age or more.

PARI-MUTUEL RACE: A race in which wagering is allowed, held at a track licensed by a state's racing commission. Pari-mutuel races are held at licensed pari-mutuel racetracks or fairs.

PARKED: A horse racing on the outside, with at least one horse between it and the inside rail. A horse on the outside of two horses is said to be **THREE WIDE**.

PHOTO FINISH: When two horses cross the finish too closely to identify a winner, officials call for a photograph of the race, taken exactly at the finish line, to help them determine who was ahead.

POCKET: A horse in the pocket is sitting in perfect position behind the leader, also known as the **two-hole** or the **pocket**.

makes him personally invested in its continued success.

Bain is especially involved in seeing the sport grow more prominent in his own area where, between Leamington and Dresden, there are only 24 race days each year. An only child, Bain is close to his parents and grandfather, and, despite preferring front-side work, enjoys jogging horses and being involved with his family's stable of five.

"I really see harness racing to be in my future," he said.

"The question mark is where. Most likely, if I want to stay an announcer, I'll have to move from the area, but I don't want to do that."

CAL EXPO HARNESS

POST POSITION: Generally, the closer a horse starts to the inside rail or barrier of the track (especially on smaller tracks), the better is its chance of winning. At the start, horses must either "leave" (start quickly) to get a good position or else find a place on the rail to avoid racing on the outside of other horses. When racing on the outside the horse is said to be "parked out", and loses ground on every turn. A horse on the inside has a better chance to get to the rail or quickly get a good position.

QUALIFIER: A race in which a horse must go a mile below an established time standard to prove itself capable of competing in pari-mutuel races.

SCRATCHING: A horse that is withdrawn (or scratched) from a race before the start.

SIRE: The male parent, or father, of a horse.

C.H.R.B. BREAKING RULES

1722. Breaking. Should any horse break from its gait in either trotting or pacing, the driver shall:

(a) Where clearance exists, take such horse to the outside.

(b) Attempt to pull the horse to its gait.

(c) Lose ground.

1723. Lapped-on Break. The driver of a horse which has broken from its gait who has complied with the breaking rule shall not be set back unless a contending horse on his gait is lapped on the hind quarter of the breaking horse at the finish.

CAL EXPO HARNESS

SIRE STAKE: Stake races designed to promote Standardbred breeding and racing within a state. Different states have different rules regulating eligibility to that state's sire stakes program. Rules include: a horse must be the offspring of a stallion standing in the state or a mare living in that state, owned by a resident of that state, or the horse was born in that state.

STAKE RACE: A race where owners make a series of payments, starting well in advance, to keep a horse eligible. If an owner misses a payment to a stakes race, the horse becomes ineligible.

STARTER: The person responsible for starting a harness race. The starter controls the start of the race from the back of the mobile starting car.

SULKY: Also known as the cart or race-bike, the sulky is attached to the harness and carries the driver and which the horse pulls.
